1. Acknowledgement of Country	
The traditional owners of the land were acknowledged.	
2. Welcome, introductions and minutes of last meeting	
Discussion: The meeting addressed the action items from the previous meeting:	
 The Alliance confirmed the receipt of a letter from the EPA, outlining the EPA as the Appropriate Regulatory Authority (ARA) for the sections of the Cooks River for which Sydney Water or a local authority is not the ARA (i.e. down stream of the Sugar Mill) 	
 The EPA gave a response to questions raised at the previous meeting: The EPA has approached Sydney Water to extend Sydney Water's removal activities to the EPA Approved Regulatory Authority (ARA) areas of the Cooks River The EPA is making an IPART submission, for a small increase in rates to assist works in the areas outside of their control. The Alliance expressed its support and interest in the IPART submission. Sydney Water (Fernando Ortega) advised that Sydney Water's new Liveable Cities section approach allows capital works for flood affected areas, and has the opportunity to submit to IPART a list of infrastructure that will protect rivers. 	
The Alliance advised the Pedestrian and Cycle Strategy 2006 is now available on the 'resources' section of the Alliance website	
The letter from the Alliance to Transport NSW was noted as an outstanding item from the previous minutes	СН
Decision: The minutes were accepted	
3. New meeting format and focus	
The Alliance explained a new format for the Catchment Stakeholders meetings. The are now to be thrice yearly meetings, and have a new focus on three standing items: litter, sewage, and weeds/pests.

4. Developing holistic approach for Cooks River Catchment Health following	
EPA determination that it is the Appropriate Regulatory Authority	
Sydney Water agreed this item would be covered during their 'Cooks River Water Quality Improvement Strategy' presentation.	
5. Reporting processes and removal actions for in-river large rubbish items	
Discussion:	
Sydney Water (Daniel Cunningham) advised that people may call Sydney Water's call centre to report large rubbish items in the river; however, response times vary according to operational priorities	
 City of Canterbury advised that agencies can petition supermarkets for coin return schemes to help prevent shopping trolleys in the River 	
 The meeting discussed the difficulty of removing large items from the River, some of which require a crane 	
Decision: The Alliance will contact SSROC and Sydney Water regarding	
opportunities to coordinate with councils a process for removal of large items in the River	СН
6. Cooks River Water Quality Improvement Strategy (Sydney Water)	
Sydney Water presented (see attached) on their plans to develop a Cooks River Water Quality Improvement Strategy, collaboratively with State agencies and councils	
Alluvium Consulting have been contracted to run the planning process, which is envisaged to take a year	
Sydney Water emphasised their desire to partner with councils in the development of the Strategy	
 Answering a question from Rockdale Council (David Dekel), Sydney Water said that the economic benefits of planning for a healthier Cooks River will be addressed in the process, as part of a separate consultancy 	
7. Climate Change Adaptation	
Cooks River Alliance (Shefali Chakrabarty) presented (see attached) on the Alliance's Climate Change Resilience Program	
Greater Sydney Local Land Services (Bill Dixon) presented (see attached) on LLS's plan being produced: 'A regional plan for adaptation and mitigation for climate change'	
 LLS is seeking interest from stakeholders in participating in the development of the Plan, which is envisaged to a take a year 	
Stakeholders at the meeting gave a brief overview on what their council/agency is	



currently doing related to Climate Change Adaptation:

- NSW Health (Graham Burgess) advised that data on the health implications
 of climate change (such as bats/rabies and pools overloading) is available on
 NSW Health website (see attached subsequent email circulated)
- City of Canterbury advised that Canterbury does risk assessments, but they
 are not connected to climate change. Emma advised that Canterbury's
 greatest challenge is climate change impacts on people.
- Strathfield Council is undertaking education in order to filter climate change research down to communities
- Ashfield Council did risk assessments in 2011 that need to be implemented
- Bankstown City Council is planning for further risk assessments
- Rockdale Council is active on climate change, including with Sydney Coastal Councils and conducting assessments of flood risk for every property in the LGA
- Marrickville will soon be exhibiting its Climate Change Adaptation Plan
- NSW Health's Health Promotion Service is shifting to a greater focus on active travel
- Sydney Water will, in the future, be requesting that developers include climate change factors in their models
- NSW Health's Public Health Unit is looking at alert systems for when impacts of climate change become emergencies.
